Choices in American Democracy

Course Description:

The curriculum for this required, unweighted, introductory course is developed from the Wisconsin Standards for Social Studies. The course is divided into 2 parts, American Government and Economics, with each topic being explored in separate trimesters. In American Government, students will explore the depth of the U.S. political system. Students will define and evaluate their rights and responsibilities necessary to participate as a productive citizen within the framework of a federal system. The course is designed to focus on the following units: Foundations of American Government, Political Behavior, Legislative Branch, Executive Branch, and Judicial Branch. In Economics, students will develop an understanding of the basic principles and practices that make up the economic system of the United States and the world. The course is designed to focus on the following topics: Money, banking, business cycles, supply & demand, production, the national economy, and the role of government in the economy are among the topics explored in this trimester.
