## **Child Development**

## **Course Description:**

The curriculum for this elective course is developed from the Wisconsin Standards for Family and Consumer Sciences. Students will examine the essential characteristics of being an effective parent. Students will identify challenges and options for teen parents. Students will discover how the health of the mother affects herself and her unborn child. Students will list physical, intellectual, emotional and social milestones from birth to 3 years of age. Students will participate in The Reality Baby Care Program and The Empathy Belly. Grades are determined by quizzes, tests, projects and daily work.

<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>What are the reasons a woman may select one type of delivery over another?</li> <li>Since each delivery is unique, what in general should be expected?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Describe signs that indicate labor.</li> <li>Summarize the three stages of labor.</li> <li>Identify the physical changes of a newborn.</li> <li>Summarize the physical and emotional needs of a mother and baby.</li> </ul>
Unit Title: Physical Development in the First Year	Students will
<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>What are some physical changes that you will see in the first year and how does that relate to their overall development?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Describe the 3 patterns that a baby's physical development follows.</li> <li>Classify reflexes, gross motor skills or fine motor skills.</li> <li>Explain the effects of heredity, nutrition, health, experiences and environment have on an infant's growth and development.</li> <li>Evaluate ways to nurture and bond with babies.</li> <li>Compare the benefits of breast milk and formula.</li> <li>Describe 5 ways to create a safe environment for baby at home.</li> </ul>

Essential Questions:     What makes an individual unique?	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Compare and contrast emotional and social development.</li> <li>Explain the importance of attachment to emotional development.</li> <li>Describe how social behavior is learned.</li> <li>Analyze the relationship of play and exploration.</li> </ul>
Unit Title: Intellectual Development in the First Year <u>Essential Questions:</u> • What developmental milestones will exist in the first year intellectually?	<ul> <li>Students will</li> <li>Learning Targets: <ul> <li>List the functions each part of the brain controls.</li> <li>Identify the development of the brain pathways.</li> <li>Summarize the importance of sensory stimulation to the intellectual development of infants.</li> <li>Identify toys appropriate for the baby's age.</li> <li>Explain how babies develop communication skills.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

Unit Title: Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS)	Students will
<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>What is needed to safeguard children?</li> <li>What are the signs of child abuse and neglect?</li> <li>What agencies have been set up to protect children?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Identify signs and symptoms of SBS.</li> <li>Explain what happens physically when a baby or small child is shaken.</li> <li>Formulate a plan for handling frustration, anger and stress when a baby cries.</li> </ul>
Unit Title: Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS)	Students will
<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>What health issues or risks related to alcohol should a pregnant woman be aware of?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Identify visible signs of FAS.</li> <li>Identify that FAS is the leading cause of preventable mental disabilities.</li> <li>List 5 possible symptoms of FAS.</li> </ul>
Unit Title: Drug - Affected Babies	Students will
<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>Should women be held criminally accountable for knowingly exposing their unborn child to drugs?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Describe how nutrients, oxygen and drugs reach a developing fetus.</li> <li>List the effects of prenatal drug exposure.</li> <li>Identify long-term consequences of prenatal drug exposure.</li> </ul>
Unit Title: Physical Development of the Child from One to Three	Students will
<ul> <li><u>Essential Questions:</u></li> <li>How do you provide for the physical developmental needs of a toddler?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Identify changes in height, weight, proportion and posture from ages 1 to 3.</li> <li>Compare fine and gross motor skills.</li> <li>Plan nutritious meals and snacks for children.</li> <li>Describe how to protect children from hazards in the home.</li> </ul>
Unit Title: Emotional and Social Development of the Child from One to Three	Students will
<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>Why is it important to understand the emotional and social development of a toddler?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Explain how self-concept develops.</li> <li>Assess the importance of sleep in emotional development.</li> <li>Describe patterns of social development.</li> <li>Identify common behavioral problems and effective methods of dealing with them.</li> </ul>

Unit Title: Intellectual Development of the Child from One to Three	Students will
<ul> <li>Essential Questions:</li> <li>What things can you implement in growing the intellectual development of a toddler?</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Learning Targets:</li> <li>Describe how intelligence and environment affect learning.</li> <li>Explain how children develop concepts in stages.</li> <li>Identify the factors that affect a child's readiness to learn.</li> <li>Explain how parents and caregivers can guide the learning of young children.</li> </ul>
