Popular Literature

Course Description:

The curriculum from the course is developed from the Wisconsin Standards for English Language Arts. It is an introductory elective course worth .5 English credits. Students will be exposed to and practice skills related to: reading literature, reading informational text, writing, speaking and listening, and language. Grades are determined by quizzes, tests, discussions, projects and daily work. In Popular Literature, we will read and examine diverse texts and discuss the conventions of different genres of literature. We will focus specifically on the ways in which the genre conventions define the texts we read and how literature provides insight into the human condition and enhances our view of the world in which we live. The information in this course overview outlines what students should understand and be able to do by the end of the trimester.
