U.S. History

Course Description:

The curriculum for this course is developed from the Wisconsin Standards for Social Studies. This required, introductory course is dedicated to the political, social, geographic and economic histories of the United States. Close attention will be paid to how various factors and situations of the nation's past have shaped the development of policies for the present date United States. In addition to focusing on a wide range of historical topics, students will also concentrate on skills needed to be successful following their high school career. The course will explore forces that have influenced the nation from its early formative years up to contemporary times. Activities will consist of simulations, readings, writings, discussions, projects, the use of multimedia, and a variety of assessments.

I will be able to explain the American policy of containment and its effectiveness in stopping the spread of communism.
Unit Title: Kennedy, Johnson, and Civil Right Movements Essential Questions: • How did the Civil Rights movement and the presidencies of Kennedy and Johnson address US foreign and domestic problems in the 1950's and 60's?	Learning Targets: I will know how Kennedy and Johnson impacted America at home and abroad. I will be able to explain the major events that led to the civil rights movement of the 1960's. I will be able to accurately explain how peaceful protest led to successful changes in the U.S. I will be able to describe some of the social changes that occurred in the U.S. as a result of the Civil Rights Era.
Unit Title: The Vietnam War Essential Questions: • What were the effects of the Vietnam War?
