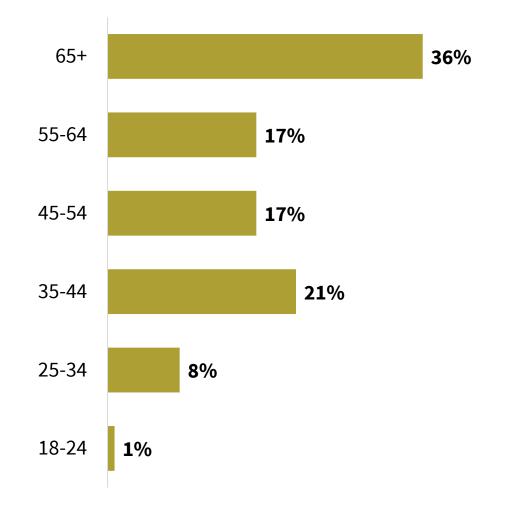

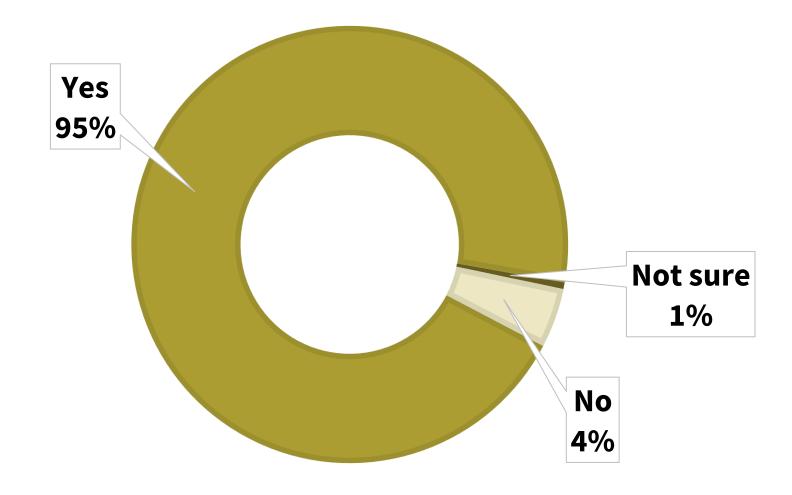
# What is your age?







# Is your primary residence in the School District of Monroe?

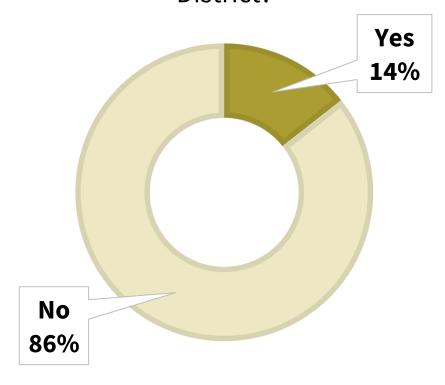




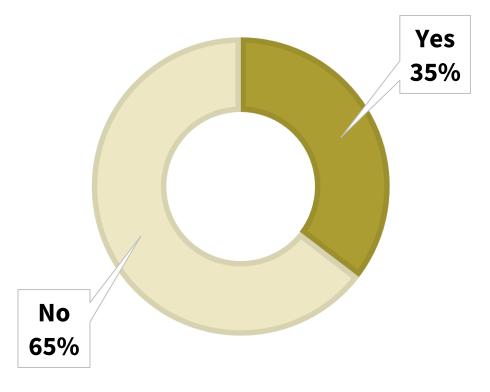

# Operational Referendum Feedback

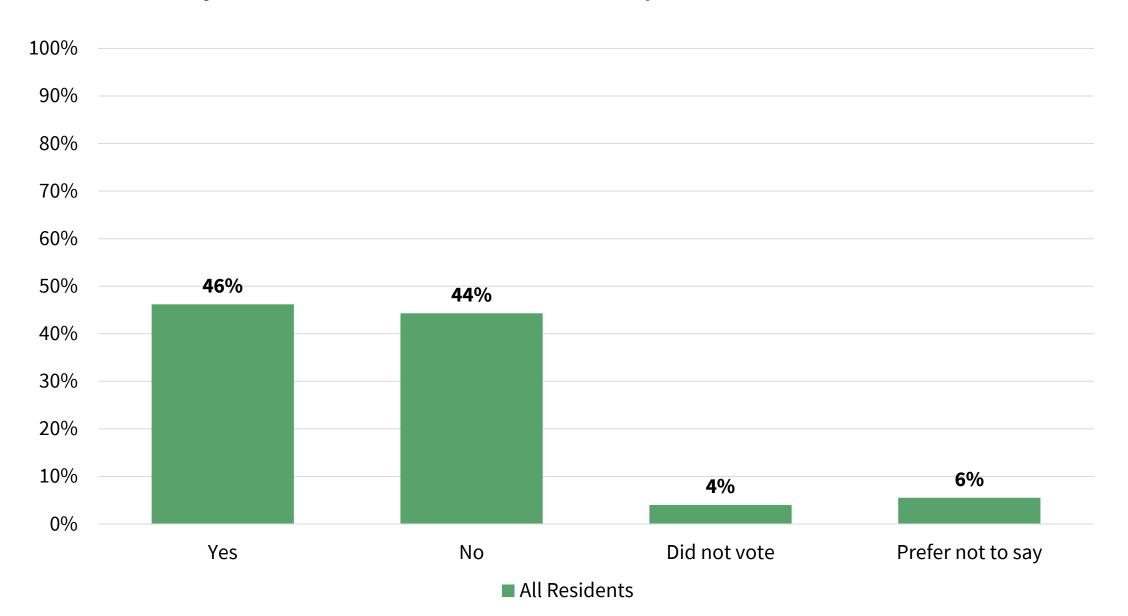
In November 2022, Monroe-area voters approved a **facilities referendum**, allowing the District to take out a loan (issue debt) to build the new high school. We are pleased the high school project is on budget. However, by law, we cannot use referendum funding for facilities for other purposes.

In November 2024, Monroe-area voters did <u>not</u> approve a \$1.5 million **operational referendum**. That funding would have been used to maintain class sizes, recruit and retain staff, and maintain current programs and services for students.





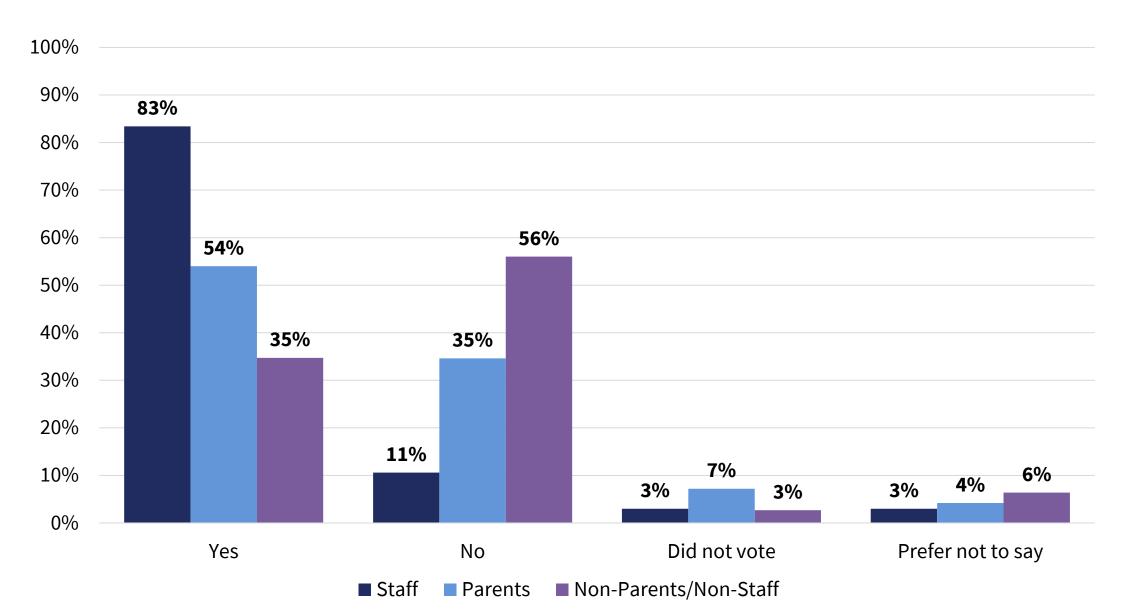
#### How did you vote on the November operational referendum?







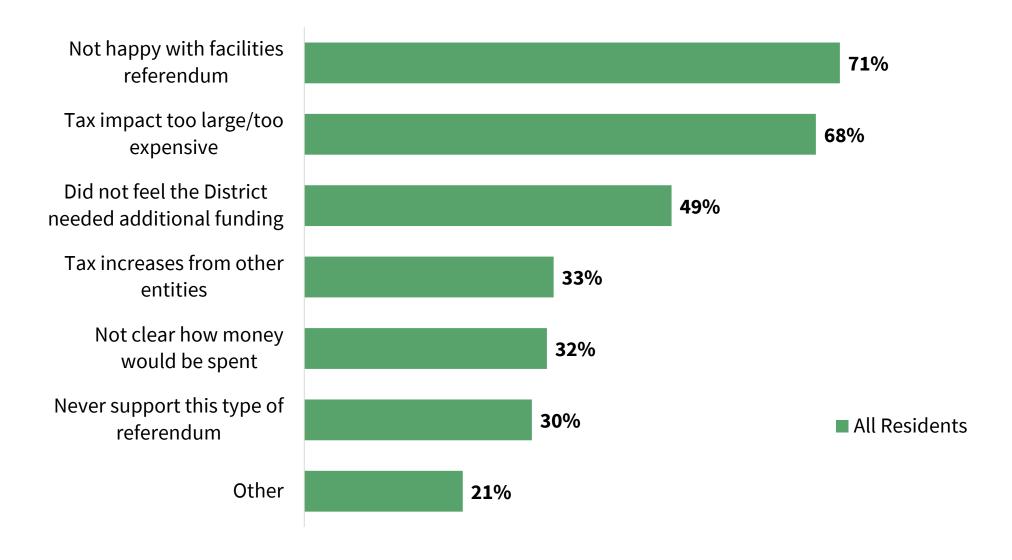
#### How did you vote on the November operational referendum?







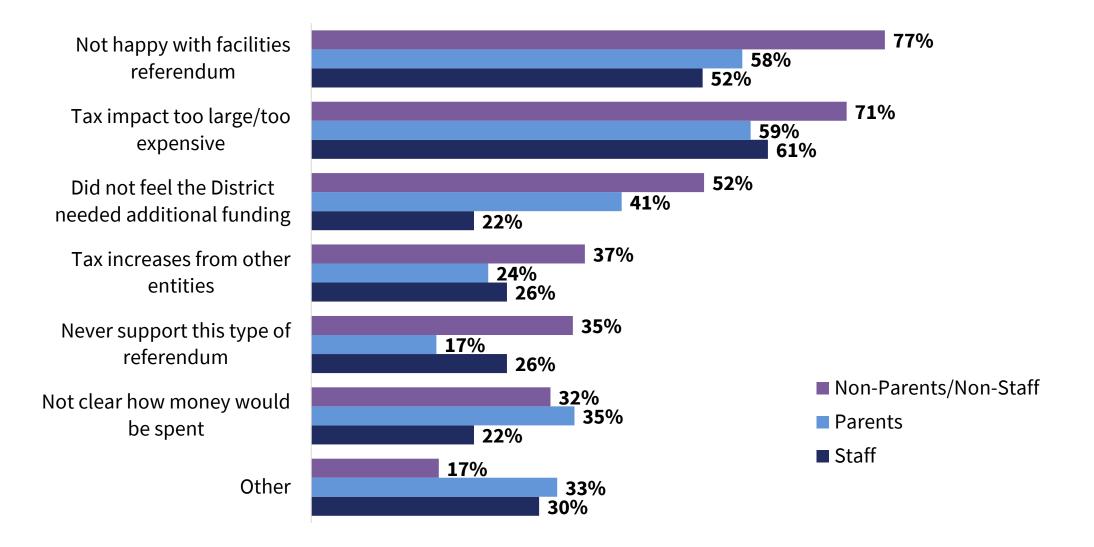
### If you voted no, what were the main reasons?

# **Budget Challenges**

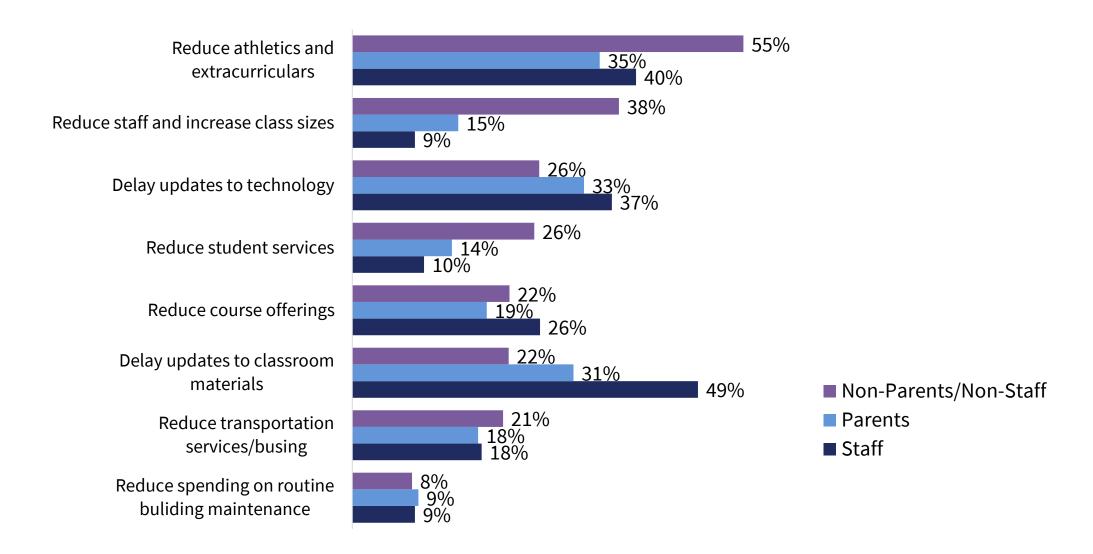
- The combination of state aid and local property taxes our schools receive used to increase with the rate of inflation. In 2009, the state budget ended this practice. If that had continued, the District would have more than \$7.2 million in additional funds this year (\$3,380 per student).
- The operational referendum voters approved in 2018 expired in June 2024. This means the District has \$1.5 million less for programs and services than last year.
- Student enrollment is declining. State funding is tied to enrollment. The fewer students we
  have, the less money we receive from the state. More specifically, enrollment has declined by
  17% since 2002, but we've reduced staffing levels by 23%.

In response to these challenges, the District cut more than \$900,000 this year. Even with these cuts, the District is projecting a budget deficit averaging \$2.6 million for each of the next three years. Because more than 70% of our budget goes to staffing, it would be very difficult to cut more from the budget without significantly impacting the educational opportunities this community expects.





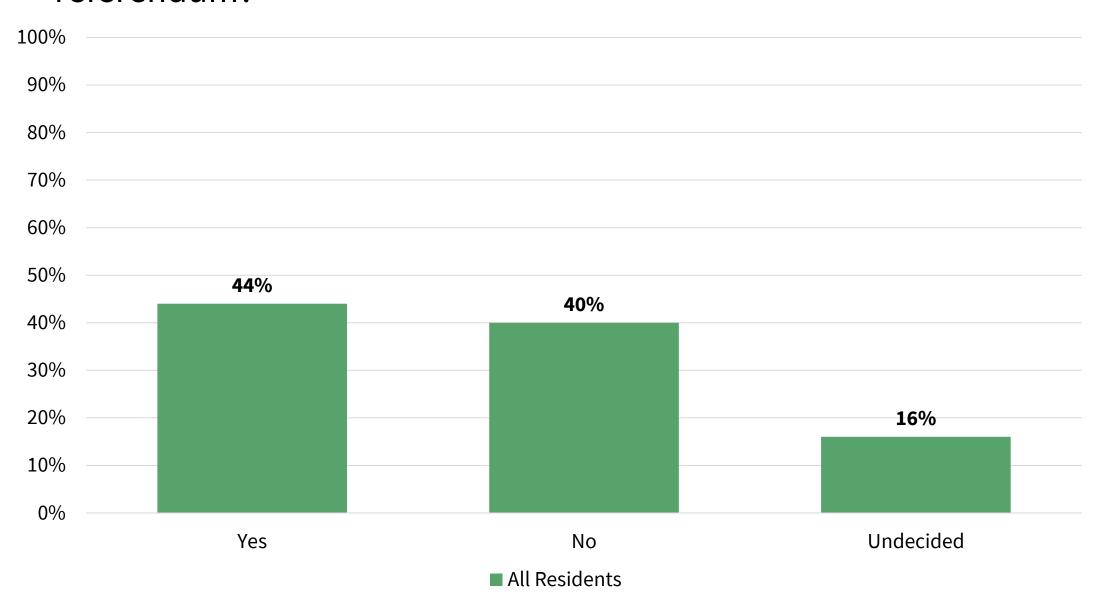

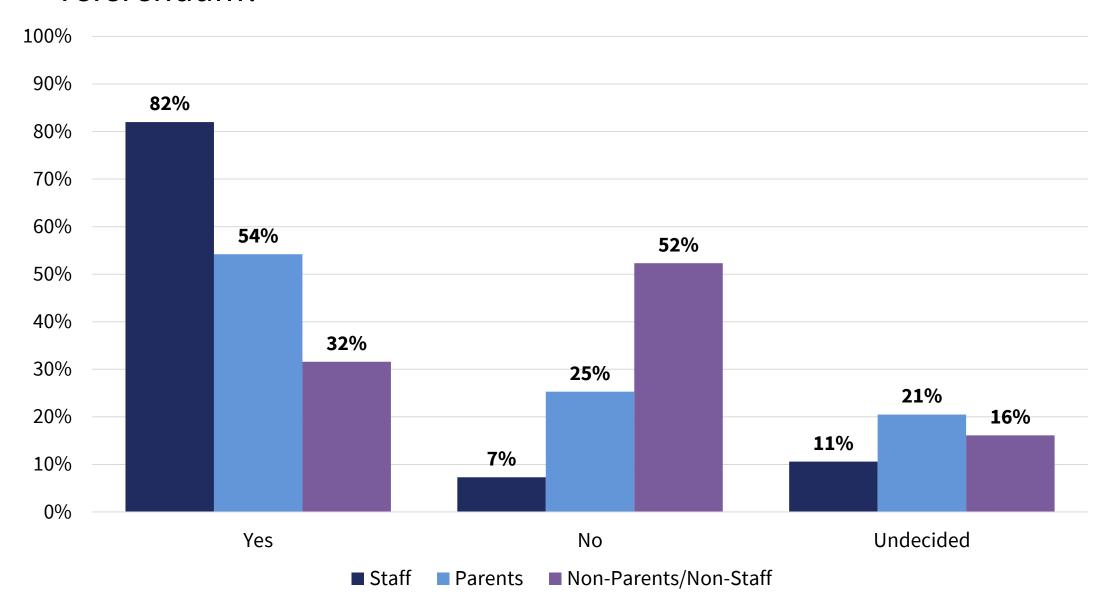
# Would you support the District pursuing another operational referendum?

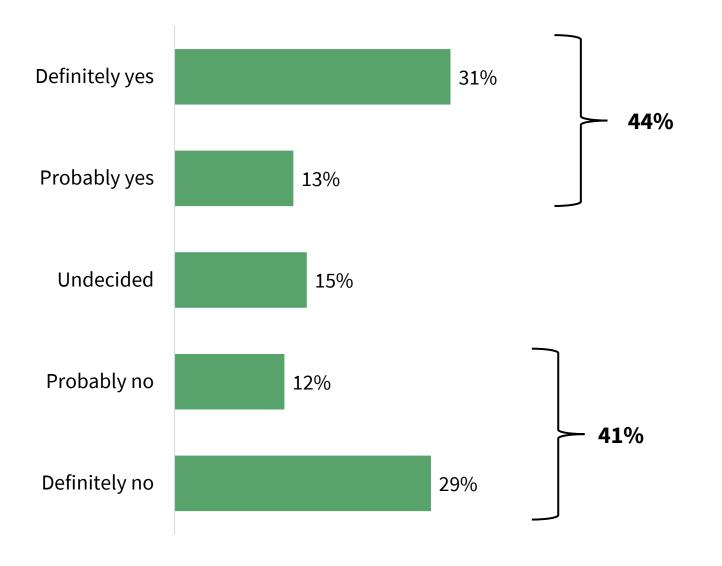
# Maintain Some Current Programs and Services



If the community supports pursuing another referendum, the following option was developed for feedback. Even if this proposed \$1.25 million referendum were approved, it would still require a combination of cuts, attrition, and decreasing the fund balance by about \$1.35 million next year.



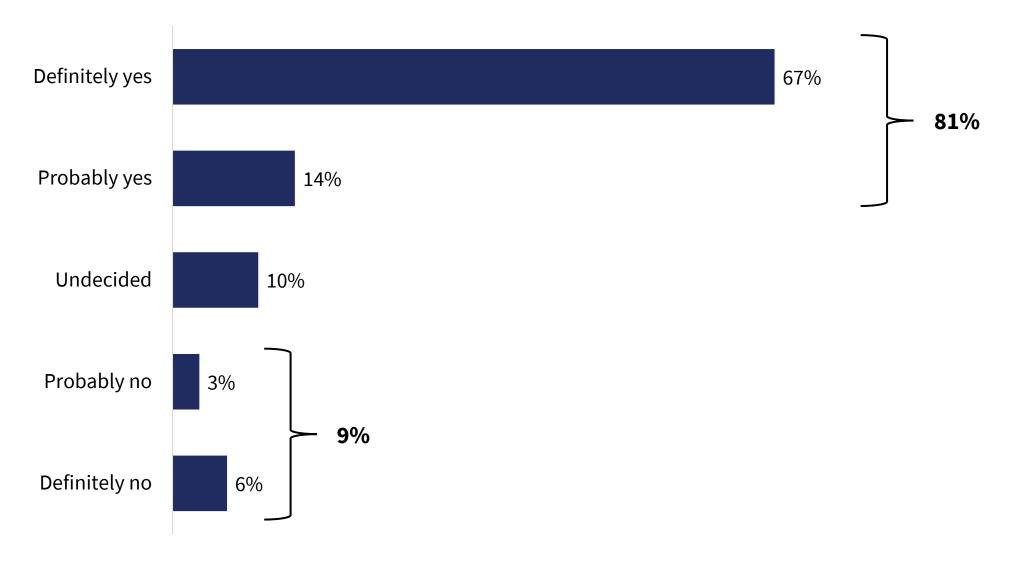
# Would you support an operational referendum that provides the District \$1.25 million for each of the next three years? (*All Residents*)







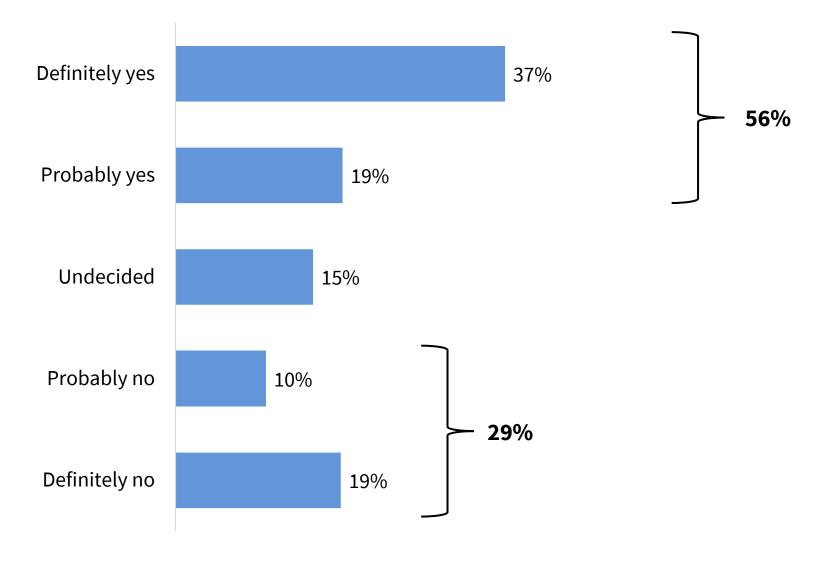
Would you support an operational referendum that provides the District \$1.25 million for each of the next three years? (*Staff Residents*)







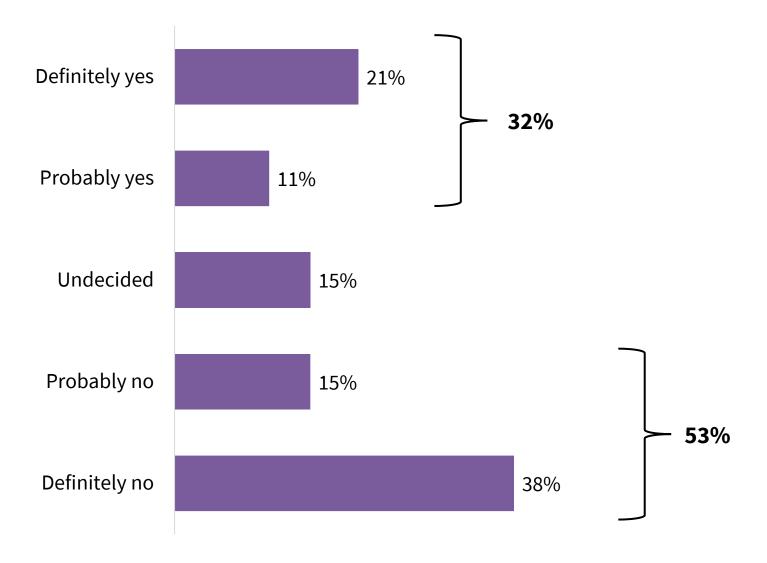
# Would you support an operational referendum that provides the District \$1.25 million for each of the next three years? (*Parent Residents*)







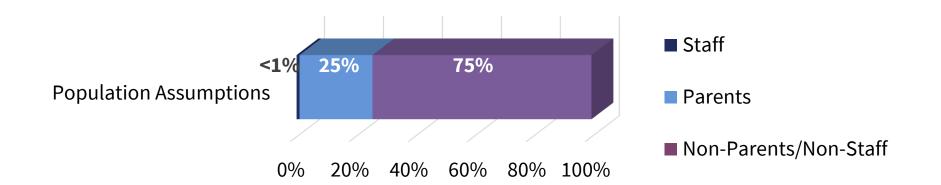
Would you support an operational referendum that provides the District \$1.25 million for each of the next three years? (Non-Parent/Non-Staff Residents)







# **Additional Analysis:** Would the \$1.25 million referendum be supported?



Weighted support for Definitely yes and Probably yes:

$$0.25 (56\%) + 0.75 (32\%) = 38\%$$





## Maintain More Current Programs and Services

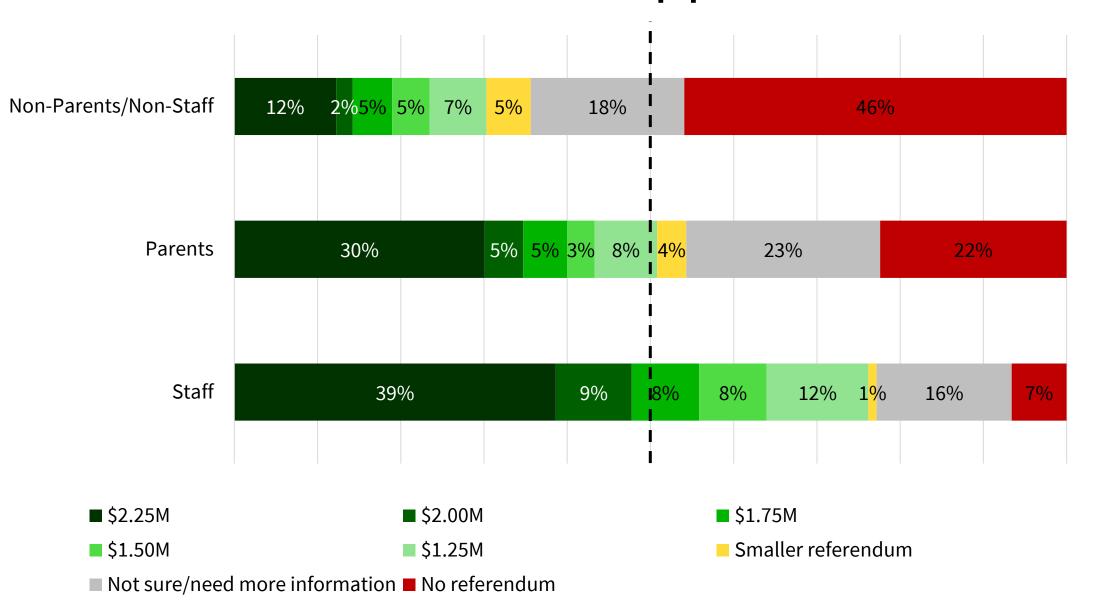
The referendum amount could be increased, allowing us to maintain more programs and services for students and reduce the size of the cuts.

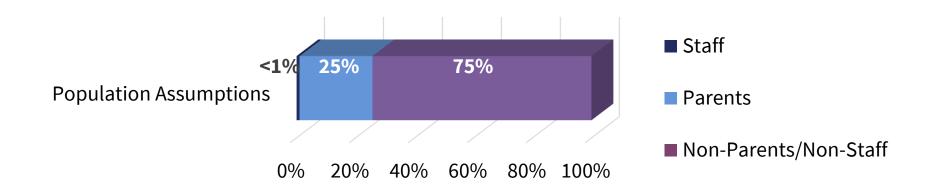
# Referendum Amount Support

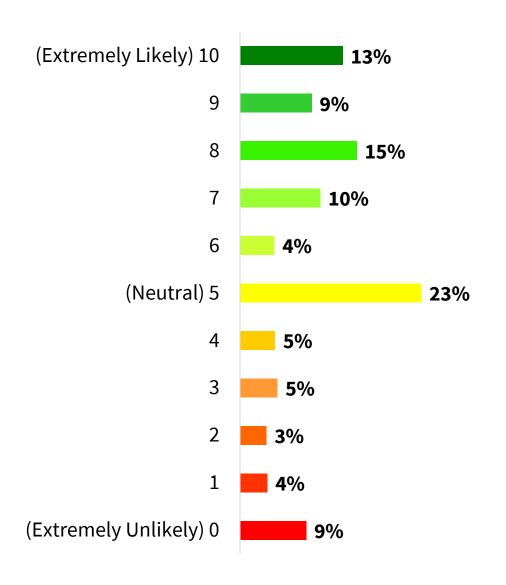
